





What is a precept?

In the parish council minutes for December there is mention of the parish precept – but what is it?

What is a Precept?

A precept payment is a tax that parish councils charge their local electors to meet their budget requirements. The precept is calculated as part of the parish council's budget and fills the gap between the council's planned expenditure and its estimated income2. Parish councils do not receive any direct funding from central government and rely on their precept plus any other income they generate from services or facilities they provide.

How is it calculated?

The precept requirement is the difference between the Parish Council's estimated income and its anticipated spending requirements for the financial year (i.e. the budget). The financial year runs from1st April to 31st March. The Parish Council needs to agree a budget before it can set its Precept, and both must be agreed by the full Parish Council.

Calculating the precept

The Parish Council takes into consideration a current year's spending levels – for ongoing services for which it is responsible e.g. recreation facilities, lighting, Cemeteries, insurance and the cost of the parish office / administration, costs of any additional spending plans or projects, provision for contingencies and reserves, levels of anticipated income from services for which it is responsible e.g. rental income, burial fees, grants, Grapevine advertising etc.

Once the precept has been approved by the Parish Council, they inform county council, and it is added to the residents council tax bills. This precept is then paid back to the parish council in two instalments (April and September)

Parking on zig zag yellow lines

This is just a gentle reminder regarding parking on zig zag yellow lines at school pick up and drop off points.

It is recognized that it is difficult to park near to school when dropping off /collecting children from school,

However the zig zag lines are there for a reason and that is safety of the children leaving and arriving at school,

AUTOMATIC HEADLIGHT CONTROLS



As we enter winter please remember this important driving tip:

The automatic headlight control in all vehicles detects brightness outside the vehicle with an Illuminance sensor which activates when light picked up by the sensor drops below a certain level.

These may NOT activate in daytime inclement weather such as snow, rain or fog, so please use your headlights manually for safety while driving in these weather conditions.

In addition, daytime running lights (DRL) on most new vehicles may activate white lights to the front but leave the taillights off which leads to many driving at night or in inclement weather feeling headlights are on without ANY rear lighting being present. If in doubt please turn your headlights on!

Success for new FraudWatch initiative led by our Force Control Room

Launched on Monday 30 October, FraudWatch is a volunteer organisation managed and lead by <u>Community Vision CIO</u>, and funded by the Police and Crime Commissioner.

It has been developed within our Force Control Room alongside our Economic Crime Unit, established to provide a wider understanding to the community about Fraud and Cybercrime.

A priority for both the force and Commissioner, the application of this initiative means we are the first force to implement such a system.

It has seen the creation of a dedicated Cyber Responder Volunteer Scheme to increase the level of customer service provided to victims of fraud by the police, to increase the speed that advice is issued to victims, as well as provide further signposting to the support services available to victims.

FraudWatch Project Co-ordinator Devan Witter said: "In the month since we launched this project, the project has provided support to 126 victims of fraud and cybercrime across the whole of our force area.

"It is important because it provides an additional level of service to victims of fraud, to ensure that victims are being provided with the right information, at the right time.

"With the Cyber Responder Volunteer service, we can also ensure that victims are provided guidance with navigating what can be a difficult time for an individual to work through, and where they have lost money or information, we can support the victim to put things in place to stop this from happening again in the future, and provide them with the information that may be useful to help them attempt to get their money back."

Calls in relation to fraud will still be transferred to the Crime Resolution Team, but instead of completing an Action Fraud referral, it will now be sent directly to the dedicated FraudWatch email address.

One of the volunteers will then review it and make the referral to Action Fraud after providing the victim with relevant advice.

Force Control Room Manager Phil Ainsworth added: "If the fraud is in progress, and incident response is required, or if additional vulnerabilities are identified, our switchboard operations will still deal accordingly.

"This means victims of fraud are getting a more well-rounded, multi-faceted partnership approach to their individual situations, in the hope that we can get the best possible outcome and ultimately continue to gain justice for victims of fraud.

"I'd like to commend my team for getting this project off the ground, and working closely with our Economic Crime Unit to understand the seriousness of this crime, the effect it has on victims, as well as giving people the tools and power to spot the signs and say no."

Detective Inspector Ben Robinson said: "Fraud is the highest concern for the public, that's behind violent crime and terrorism, and above sexual offences. This just shows how crucial it is to disrupt fraudsters and protect the public – ensuring nobody becomes a victim of fraud due to lack of awareness.

"The impact of fraud can be considerable, having a huge effect on people's confidence and wellbeing, as well as their financial situation. I too have been a victim in the past and can really relate to the victims we speak to daily.

"We need continue to increase knowledge of the many different types of fraud and methods used, but most of all we really want to empower people to be able to protect themselves and those they love from becoming a victim of these crimes.

"Only one in seven cases are reported to the police, but we need to ensure more is reported and give people the confidence to do so. As we can see already, after just one month of this project being in action, the figures are already dramatically increasing."

This project has been funded by the Police and Crime Commissioner, Jonathan Evison, from the Ministry of Justice Victims Grant.

He said: "I am really pleased to support this FraudWatch programme within the Force Control Room. This funding of £50,000 will allow victims of fraud to receive a support call after they have reported the crime.

"Often perpetrators of fraud are outside of the UK, making it difficult for the police to prosecute. This service will help victims to move forward with their lives."

Happy New Year! Thoughts from Rev. Ann Lett

Well, one of the busiest seasons is over, and we begin to prepare ourselves for season of Easter. I wonder how many of us have already spotted the Crème Egg in the shops.

New Year is often a time when we promise ourselves, we'll exercise more, drink less, eat more healthily, and again, I wonder how many of us have already broken our New Year's Resolutions? I don't tend to make any resolutions anymore, because I very easily slip back into my old ways. There's something to be said for not setting yourself up to fail, but that doesn't stop me wanting to be a better person.

Within the Methodists tradition, we have a wonderful service called the Covenant Service, usually held in September, at the beginning of our new Connexional year, or in January. John Wesley invited the Methodist people to renew their covenant relationship with God, drawing much of his material from the 17th Century Puritans.

The Covenant Service is my favourite service, and I look forward to leading this act of worship and renewing my relationship with God. For me, it's a time to remember the promise that God made, all those years ago, to his people; a reminder for us that His covenant is still valid in the 21st Century. All that remains is to wish you a very happy New Year from myself and all the shed members.



Select "Can I report an issue with a road, footpath or kerb?"

Where the issue is located i.e., "Road" or "Footpath" and "Pothole" then follow the prompts which establish as near as can where the pothole is. Log in/register and fill in the online form with as much detail as possible.

If the issue is dangerous to pedestrians or road users, as this is an emergency issue outside of office hours, please report it immediately to (01482) 393939.

Armada Celebrations – Holme on Spalding Moor July 1988

Beacons blazed across Humberside to celebrate the defeat at sea of the Spanish Armada 400 years ago in 1988 and this is an extract from a local newspaper submitted by Christine Green for inclusion in Grapevine. The photographs were also supplied by Christine.

Communities across the county joined in the fun with pageantry, fancy dress barbeques and the ceremonial lighting of beacons to form a chain of fire.

Holme on Spalding Moor celebrated the Spanish set-back with a day of pageant involving 2,000 villagers and visitors. Local schoolchildren, most wearing period costume, staged an afternoon of Tudor fair in the playground. They lobbed wet sponges at Deputy Head Bob Bury – held securely in the stocks – and recreated the famous game of bowls.

Maypole dancing, singing led by Headmaster Cliff Robson and other Elizabethan-style entertainment completed a programme which had been planned for a year.

Half the population swelled by people from throughout the region, turned out the previous night for a procession around Holme via Church Hill to the beacon site at Bar Farm. Carrying 300 lighted candles, they watched as local "Fire over England" co-ordinator Councillor. Mrs Doreen Engall and farmer Alan Marsland lit the 16ft high brazier.

"It's been a perfect day with the whole village coming together to enjoy themselves," said Councillor Mrs Engall, who hoped the day of celebrations would generate increased tourism in the area.

<u>DOG POO – WHAT CAN HAPPEN IF YOU DON'T CLEAN UP</u>

SADLY THE VAST IMPROVEMENT IN CLEARING UP AFTER YOU'RE DOG HAS GONE INTO REVERSE – SO THIS MESSAGE IS REPEATED

Dog 'poo' can be picked up on pram wheels, children's shoes, hands, etc and this can be transferred to children's mouths very easily. Do you know what the consequences could be?

Campylobacteriosis symptoms include diarrhoea, cramping, abdominal pain, and fever. The illness typically lasts one week but for people with compromised immune systems, Campylobacter can spread to the bloodstream and **result in a life-threatening infection.**

E. coli and other faecal coli form live in the intestines of many animals. Certain strains can escape into the bloodstream, or cause stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, and fever. For people with weakened immune systems, **E.coli infection can result in death.**

Salmonellosis is the most common bacterial infection transmitted to humans by other animals. Symptoms include fever, muscle aches, headache, vomiting, and diarrhoea.

Yersiniosis is another bacterial disease that can cause intestinal infections in people. Yersinia can multiply in cold water, unlike many other bacteria and may be found in elevated numbers in ponds, puddles and lakes as they thaw in the spring.

Toxocariasis is an illness found in humans that occurs when they are infected with parasitic roundworms, originating from either the fecal matter of dogs and foxes (<u>Toxocara canis</u>), or cats (<u>Toxocara cati</u>). Although most people might display symptoms similar to the flu, there are certain instances, where the illness can turn into a more severe form known as Ocular Toxocariasis that has the potential to cause blindness

The above can be fatal in certain conditions therefore please, please clean up after your dog. You could face a fine of £1,000 if you are caught.

Can we get through?

If a fire engine can't get down your street due to parked vehicles, this will cost us vital time in responding to emergencies. Next time you park, remember:

- Don't park too close to corners.
- When parking opposite another vehicle, remember the three-metre rule. This is how much space our fire engines need to get through.
- Park as close to the kerb as you can.
- Always obey road markings such as yellow lines and box junctions.
- NEVER park on the yellow markings outside our fire stations.
- If any emergency services vehicle is parked 'in your way', please be considerate and patient as we are responding to an emergency.



When there is a forecast of strong and potentially disruptive winds there is the potential to cause damage to trees, including fallen trees and branches which can be reported via our website.
